Movement into Theater

Hundreds of 27th Brigade Combat Team troops began movement into the Area of Operations during the first week of April. In a series of flights built around "force packages" also referred to as "chalks," members of the Headquarters Company 27th BCT, the Security Force and Logistical Task Force battalions, and the Training Assistance Group were flown out from Fort Bragg, NC. The team was moved in a series of flights, some flying days apart from each other and others within hours. The route took most through civilian airports in Bangor, Maine and Leipzig, Germany before moving on to military bases in Kuwait or elsewhere in Southwest Asia. The Soldiers will have a chance to

rest and prepare for the last leg of the trip into Afghanistan. The long journey that lasted for hours will ultimately bring them all to Camp Phoenix near Kabul, Afghanistan. Some will remain there while others will be pushed out to other Forward Operating Bases.
